Legal Mandate

Under the Child & Family Services Act (Ontario)

The functions of a children's aid society are to:

- ➤ investigate allegations or evidence that children who are under the age of sixteen years or are in the Society's care or under its supervision may be in need of protection;
- protect, where necessary, children who are under the age of sixteen years or are in the Society's care or under its supervision;
- provide guidance, counselling and other services to families for protecting children or for the prevention of circumstances requiring the protection of children;



Legal Mandate (cont'd)

- provide care for children assigned or committed to its care under this Act;
- supervise children assigned to its supervision under this Act;
- > place children for adoption under Part VII; and
- perform any other duties given to it by this or any other Act.



What we know

- The outcomes for children who reside in family-based care (education, overall physical and emotional health, developing and sustaining relationships with positive role models, etc.) are universally better than those for children who reside in institutional care.
- Historically, once a child came into care, there was a strong likelihood he/she will grow up in care - no longer the case!
- Once a child remains in care for more than 60 days, the likelihood that he/she will remain in care significantly increases.

What we know

- Children are better off when they are supported in their own homes, and in their own communities, whenever possible.
- Children are better off when there is support for caregivers to care for their own children (building on existing strengths, protective capacities).
- Over 90% of the children we work with are in their own families



What we know

- When the child cannot remain in his/her home, extended family is always the preferred option.
- Efforts to repatriate children-in-care and their families continue after admission.
- Finding permanent homes for children who remain in care is a priority (adoption, guardianship, kinship care)

(AOP subcommittee)


- Primary purpose is to educate our staff on needs and concerns of Black children and their families

 Data, outcomes, performance indicators, quality assurance and continuous quality improvement are important accountability mechanisms that are evolving in child welfare and at Durham CAS







Admission Prevention (2014/2015)




Children in Care



Children in Care by Resource Type




Protection Referral Sources






Comparison of Race Data (Ages 0-19)




Children in Care by Race



Children in Care by Placement




Black Children by Placement Type

(n=80)






DCAS Foster Care Resources by Primary Caregiver Race
