MESSAGE FROM STEVE WOODMAN, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

To say that it has been an unusual first year for me at DCAS is an understatement. Who could have anticipated COVID19, a workforce almost overnight transitioning to working from home and delivering much of its services on-line? It has been a challenge, but one that I am proud to say our staff approached with flexibility and creativity, always keeping the needs of those we serve top of mind.

At the end of our fiscal year - six months into my tenure - we were faced with a pandemic that has forced us to rethink how we deliver services in a time of social distancing, food insecurity and the wearing of masks.

The resilience of our staff, caregivers and the children, youth and families we serve has certainly been tested. Staff, along with foster and kin families have adapted to new processes and technology while supporting children, youth and families throughout this difficult time.

From March through August we implemented a strategy to ensure that many of the basic needs of our clients were met by buying in bulk baby food, groceries, diapers, hygiene items and recreational items for children. In total the program cost \$183,000, delivering over 1,000 hampers to families.

This effort would not have been possible without the support of several community partners. The Durham Children's Aid Foundation assisted in funding the food and care items, as well as securing donations of backpacks and other items. Mackie Moving Systems proved to be of invaluable help in delivering countless skids of food over several months to our office. We were living our values of providing extraordinary support to families in times of crisis.

There has been a shift in our work with families, with a growing focus on their strengths and ensuring that we listen to the voices of all of the children, youth and families we encounter. I was pleased when I came to DCAS to see that the agency had made a commitment to implement the principles of Signs of Safety. This is an ongoing process that we are weaving into all aspects of our work to ensure that the voices of those impacted by our services are heard and are included in the planning for their own families.

I look for evidence of success in our work. If we are to demonstrate our stated commitment to "front-end" our service by improving our supports to families, then that should be evident in our statistics. I am fortunate to join an agency that has been working hard on this for many years. On March 31, 2010 DCAS had 889 children and youth in care of the society.

One decade later, March 31, 2020 that number was down to 335. Even adjusting for the 68 Indigenous children and youth that transferred to Dnaagdawenmag Binnoojiiyag the reduction is well over 50%- clear evidence that there has been a significant evolution in the manner that our services are being delivered.

While we can be proud of our demonstrated success, we also realize that there is still much work to do. The Ontario government is in the process of implementing Child Welfare Modernization. This aligns with the work we have been doing, but it is calling not only DCAS, but also our community partners to a much higher standard in addressing the needs of those in our communities.

There is a clear expectation for us to grow our many wonderful collaborations, and to develop new ones, as part of community health and well-being approaches to services. This will be a significant part of our consultation process in the development of a new Strategic Plan for the agency later this fiscal year.

The government is giving us increasing flexibility in how we spend our funding with the clear expectation that child welfare will continue to shift its spending from in-care services to supporting families in new, pro-active and expanded ways. We welcome this direction and challenge.

While we have demonstrated great success in reducing the number of children and youth in care, it is important for us to acknowledge and continue to address the overrepresentation of black children in care. We are benefiting from the willingness of the black community to work with us through a cooperative Community Advisory Council. We recognize that this work needs to be informed and prolonged, and demonstrate tangible results.

As Executive Director I give my personal commitment to this work and I say on behalf of myself and the agency – Black Lives Matter.
