

Human Trafficking





Human trafficking has had a devastating impact on many children, youth and families in Durham Region, including some served by Durham Children's Aid Society. As such, we provide support for those affected in collaboration with our community partners. We provide resources and protection services for affected children, youth and families, and we support advocacy efforts to combat human trafficking.

What is Human Trafficking?

"Human trafficking" refers to the recruiting, transporting, transferring, harbouring or receiving of an individual for the purpose of sexual labour or exploitation.

This is done by means of deception, fraud, coercion,

This is done by means of deception, fraud, coercion, abuse of power, payment to others in control of the individual, threats of force, use of force, or abduction.

Please ask for help if you or a friend are involved with someone who exhibits any of the following characteristics:

- Promises things that seem too good to be true
- · Buys expensive gifts or likes to flash their money
- Creates distance between you and your family or friends
- Suggests that they know how to help you make a lot of money
- Encourages you to engage in illegal activities to achieve your goals or dreams
- Introduces you to sex, sexting, porn or strip clubs
- · Has money, but are vague about how they obtained it
- Gets pushy or demanding about sex
- Wants to take suggestive photos, encourages you to model or dance for money
- Makes you feel responsible to pay him/her back, help him/her financially
- Becomes abusive (verbally, physically, psychologically)

CARE Team

The Children at Risk of Exploitation (CARE) Team is comprised of staff from Durham Children's Aid Society, Durham Regional Police Service, Victim Services of Durham Region, and Dnaagdawenmag Binnoojiiyag Child & Family Services. This is a specialized, multidisciplinary intervention team formed to proactively identify, investigate, locate and engage children and youth who are at a high risk of, or are victims of, sex trafficking, with the goal of protecting our community.
